

Preschool Ministry Curriculum for August 21, 2016

Dear Teacher,

This week we continue our summer curriculum, which is following the theme and preaching from the Sanctuary service. Just to note, we are a few weeks ahead of the Sanctuary service in case there is any confusion. This summer we will look back at most of the characters we studied this past year. The point of each lesson will center on the journey each person was on and how they ultimately looked to Jesus "as the author and perfecter of our faith."

Today we learn about Samson. Samson was a special judge in that he defeated Israel's enemies by himself; Samson did not have an army to help him as some of the other judges had. Samson fights against the cruel Philistines. God gives Samson an incredible amount of strength, but Samson lives a reckless life. Today we want to look at just how strong Samson was and how he helps deliver God's people from the cruelty of the Philistines.

We encourage all classrooms to engage with the story from the options provided in class. Teachers, <u>tell</u> the story using any of the provided helps (Vos, Jesus Story Book Bible, Gospel Story Book Bible or printed Handout). If you would like, read the selected Scripture passages aloud in class, discuss or explain what the passages mean, and use the questions below to help guide the discussion. Also, use time in class to teach the Scripture Memory and the Catechism Questions.

Lesson: The Journey: Samson

Lesson Objective: To communicate to children that God's promises require faith especially since God's promises do not happen immediately.

Scripture: Hebrews 11:32-33; Judges 13-16 (selected portions)

Story: Vos Children's Bible, Chapter 62; Gospel Story Book Bible, Pages 96-97; The Beginner's Bible, Pages 148-153.

Teaching Points:

- To believe that God's promises will come true is called faith.
- God's promises do not change despite circumstances, people and even our inability to believe them. God keeps his promises even when we do not trust Him or follow His commands.
- God was with His people, the Israelites, and He never left them.
- God's people had now entered the Promised Land, but the land was full of people that did not worship God and did not like God's people.
- God's people did not always worship God or follow His commands. God would discipline them. Sometimes Israel's enemies would hurt them or rule over them. God would bring judges to rescue His people. Judges ruled over all of Israel.
- God made Samson a judge to rescue His people from the Philistines.
- God gives Samson the power and strength to defeat the Philistines.

Craft: Samson Hair

Supplies: 2 sheets of black construction paper, head band strip, stapler Instructions: Staple head band strip to fit child's head, staple 2 black sheets to the head band strip leaving space for child's face.

Craft: Strong Samson
Supplies: 1 small and 1 large popsicle stick, brown yarn, silver beads, black pipe cleaner
Instructions: Glue popsicle sticks together (small stick as arms, large as body), glue brown yarn as hair, draw a face, string beads on pipe cleaner and attach to stick hands as barbells.

Story: The Journey: Samson

- 1. **PRAY** for your time and any requests the children may have.
- 2. **ASK** the Transition Question: Boys and girls, today we are going to talk about one of the strongest people to ever live. But before we do, tell me something you think a strong person should be able to do? (Teacher, you should lead off, i.e., "They should be able to do 100 pushups!"; let each child have a turn). Well let's find out what our strong man did that made him so incredible...
- 3. **TELL** the Story. When applicable or desired, use the Vos Children's Bible, the Jesus StoryBook Bible, the Beginner's Bible, or the story below to aid in telling the story.
- 4. **REVIEW** the questions to help children understand the story.

Scripture

Hebrews 11:32-33

Do I need to give more examples? I do not have time to tell you about Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, David, Samuel, and the prophets. Through their faith they defeated kingdoms. They did what was right and received what God promised.

- What is the name of the people who did not worship God in this story?
- What did Samson kill on the road?
- What did Samson find in the dead lion later on?
- How many foxes did Samson tie together?
- What happened to the fields and vineyards?
- What happened to the city gates in Gaza?

Questions for Older Children:

- Do you think Samson is mean to the Philistines?
- How does God keep His promise in this story?

<u>Story</u>

The Journey

Let us continue on our journey together. Remember, we actually won't go to a far land or country. And we won't have to pack up our suitcases or food, get in a car or plane and travel to some place across the world either. Nope, we will stay right here! This journey is special. This journey takes us into the Old Testament and we get to see how people trusted in Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith.

Last week we learned about a judge named Gideon. God used Gideon to deliver his people from the Midianites. Gideon had an army of only 300 men who defeated a very, very large army with some strange weapons. Gideon

eventually died, and once he did the Israelites, God's people, quickly began worshipping other gods. God was not happy with this and allowed another very mean people, called the Philistines, to defeat His people. God's people did not like the Philistines; the Philistines were mean to the Israelites. God then raised up another judge to deliver His people. The name of this judge was Samson.

Today in our journey, we learn that Samson was incredibly strong and He used His strength to defend and protect God's people.

Samson Is Born

The Bible says one day, the angel of the LORD appeared to a lady who had wanted a baby but who didn't have one. The angel of the LORD said, "You are going to have a baby, a boy baby, a very special baby. This boy is to be set aside. As a sign of this his hair must never be cut. And when he grows up, he will begin to deliver Israel from the hands of the enemy, the Philistines." Sure enough, just like the angel of the Lord had promised, baby Samson was born! And as he grew older Samson became very strong, very powerful. He was a great leader in Israel and the Philistines were afraid of him because of his strength. God had given Samson that great strength.

The Ferocious Lion

The Bible says one day as Samson was walking toward a village suddenly a lion came roaring toward him. When that happened the Spirit of the Lord came upon Samson with power so that he fought that lion and killed it! And Samson didn't even have a weapon. He fought the lion with his bare hands!

One day Samson decided he wanted to get married, but he did not want to marry any of the Israelite women. He told his parents, "Find me a wife! But no one from Israel!" The parents complained and then went to him, "How are we going to find you a wife? We do not know anyone but Israelites!" Eventually Samson found a woman he loved, but she was a Philistine. Remember, Philistines hated God and His people. Samson and his parents decided to visit this Philistine woman one day, and as they were coming home from their visit Samson noticed something. Off to the side of the road was the dead lion with bees swarming all around it. Honeybees had built a hive inside the dead lion. Samson loved honey, so he reached into the beehive and grabbed some honey. He ate the honey and gave some to his parents to eat too.

A Hard Riddle

A few months later Samson was married and there was a big party that he had. Samson invited many people and they celebrated for a week. At this party everyone told riddles. Samson told a riddle about the lion and the honey. His riddle went like this, "Out of the eater came forth food, and out of the strong came forth sweetness." Samson offered a reward if anyone could answer the riddle; he said, "If you answer my riddle by the end of the week, I will give you 30 shirts and 30 robes. But! If you do not answer the riddle by the end of the week, then you have to give me 30 shirts and 30 robes." Several people at the party wanted to answer the riddle especially the Philistine men. The whole week the Philistine men tried to answer the riddle but they could not. They were becoming very scared and angry. On the very last day of the party the Philistine men went to Samson's wife became scared. She begged and pleaded with Samson to tell her the answer. At first he did not want to tell her the answer, but he finally gave in because he could not stand to hear her complain.

Samson's wife went and told the Philistine men. The men quickly ran to Samson and said, "What is sweeter than honey, and what is strong than a lion?" Samson became very, very angry. He knew his wife had betrayed him. Samson gave the Philistine men the 30 shirts and 30 robes, but he stormed off after he did it. He did not talk to his wife for a very long time because he was so mad.

300 Foxes

Eventually Samson's anger left him and he wanted to go and apologize to his wife for being so angry with her and not talking or seeing her for a long time. Samson headed back to where his wife was living in a Philistine village. He brought presents with him just to be extra nice. When Samson arrived he found his wife's father working in the field and asked where he could find her. The father told Samson, "I thought you did not love her anymore and did not want to be married to her any longer. So we decided she could marry another guy!" Samson quickly became angry again. Samson said, "Now it is not my fault if the Philistines pay for this." Samson caught 300 foxes. He turned them tail-to-tail and tied the two tails together with a piece of dry wood between them. Then he set the wood on fire, and let the foxes go into the grain fields of the Philistines. This set the grain on fire until the entire harvest was burned, and the vineyards too.

The Philistines were very angry. They shouted, "Who did this?" Someone replied back, "Samson!" The Philistines knew they could not beat up Samson, for he was too strong. So the Philistines hurt Samson's wife and her father. This made Samson even angrier; Samson went and picked a big fight with a lot of Philistines and beat them up. Finally, when the fight was over, Samson was tired, lonely and did not want to be around anyone. He went back to his hometown and found a cave at the top of a very high mountain. Samson lived in the cave for some time.

The Jawbone of a Donkey

When more Philistine men found out that Samson had beaten up so many Philistines, they went looking for him. There were many, many Philistines out looking for Samson. These rough and wild Philistines scared God's people, but when they found out the Philistines only wanted Samson, some of God's people started to look for him. Three thousand men from God's people gathered together to find Samson. Once they found Samson in his cave they asked, "Why have you done all these things to the Philistines? Don't you see that you've made trouble for us!" Samson answered back, "I have treated them just as they have treated me." The men of Israel said, "We've come to tie you up and give you over to the Philistines." Samson probably laughed, but he let the Israelites tie him up and give him over to the Philistines. The Philistines wanted very badly to catch Samson, to capture him and put him in prison so that he wouldn't bother them anymore. The Bible says they tied him with two strong ropes. Once the Philistines saw Samson tied up, they came running and shouting toward him. Then the Spirit of the Lord came over Samson in power and the ropes on his arms became like thin little strings and just fell off. Then Samson saw a bone lying on the ground. It was the bone of a dead animal. Quickly Samson reached down and grabbed the bone and with his great strength he struck the Philistines. Samson killed 1,000 of them that day.

The City Gates

A few weeks later Samson went back into one of the cities of the Philistines. The name of the city was Gaza. During this time in the Bible cities had high walls and very big, thick gates that they closed at night. Samson entered the city during the day. The city rulers found out and made a plan. "We will close the gates at nightfall, and then in the morning when he tries to leave we will catch him and throw him in prison" said the city leaders. Well in the middle of the night Samson decided he was ready to go home. He got up and saw the gates completely shut, but that did not stop Samson. Samson walked up to the gates and pulled the doors right off. He carried the huge doors for thirty miles until he was back in his hometown.

Samson was a very mighty and strong judge for Israel. Samson got his strength from God. Samson defended Israel during these very troublesome years. You can imagine how much the Philistines wanted to get rid of Samson! They knew about his great strength and wanted to find out where it came from. Remember the Philistines did not like God and they did not like God's people, the Israelites. The Philistines did not understand that God had given Samson the strength and that God was using Samson to defend his people.
